Education Week 2020

'Learning together' is the theme of Education Week. This week we are celebrating how we have worked together across many years to give our students/children the best opportunities.

Over the past year, the need to 'learn together' remotely has seen the local school become the epicentre of recovery and resilience from the impact of bushfires, floods and the COVID-19 pandemic.

Due to the COVID-19 restrictions we cannot hold our usual open classrooms and special assembly. We will still present our special Education Week Certificates to students from each class that demonstrate our FISH values of being Fair, Inclusive Safe and Honest. These presentations will be recorded and posted up for all to see. Classes will also be preparing a short tour of their classroom and uploading it to their Blog.

Kinder 2021

If you have or know of any prospective kinders for next year that have not enrolled, please contact our school office so they can be given our school information and we can start our planning for next year. We currently cannot hold our normal Kinder Orientation Program and will let all 2021 kinder parents know how we will be addressing orientation as soon as we can.

As you would be aware, the Department of Education revised their enrolment policies last year, redefining the zoning areas for public schools. If you are in a school's drawing zone, your rights to enrolling in your local school have not changed. Attendance

Being at school is so important for children's academic and social development. Regular attendance enables students to develop a sense of belonging to a peer group and building important coping and friendship skills. Confident children are less likely to engage in anti-social behaviour.

If students miss out on the basic skills in the early years of school, they may experience learning problems in later years. If a student arrives 10 minutes late each day, they are effectively missing 15 minutes by the time they get to class and even more by the time they catch up with what everyone else is doing. That's easily over 1 hour a week, close to 3 days per term and more than 2 weeks in a year.

National Consistent Collection if Data (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD collection assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools

• develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.



The novel is very sensory in its descriptions and over the last couple of weeks we have been producing sensory poems relating to a number of different topics. This Thursday, we plan to venture out into the forested area adjacent to the school for crunch and sip and immerse ourselves in the different sensations of the environment.

This crosses over nicely with our HSIE "Blue Marble" unit which focuses on sustainability, life cycles and ecosystems where we have recently learned about producers, consumers and decomposers. Think about similes that describe large and small.


